Studying in Germany and Britain

- Have any of you studied in another country? What were your experiences?
- Bachelor degree in Glasgow, Scotland
 - University was not just about studying
 - Mainly lectures with a few seminars. Students were not used to debating and speaking in group
- Master degree in Berlin
 - Students more focused on their studies and goal-orientated
 - Classes discussion-orientated with an emphasis on presenting and debating
 - A lot more students work at the university

+ In your country?

- Do students only study in order to get a good job, or is it more about the experience and an opportunity to get to know people?

- People often talk about their profession in their free time, e.g. at a party
- Berlin – People can be quite direct....
