

As much as any other nation, Germany has long been understood in terms of totalizing narratives. For Anglo-American observers in particular, the legacies of two world wars still powerfully define twentieth-century German history, whether through the lens of Nazi-era militarism and racial hatred or the nation's emergence as a "model" postwar industrial democracy. From American perceptions of the Kaiserreich to the challenges posed by a multicultural Europe, the volume argues for—and exemplifies—an approach to German Studies that is nuanced, self-reflective, and holistic.

In *Different Germans, Many Germanies* a younger generation of scholars trace some of these complex and multifaceted realities through their case studies. The contributors of this volume's chapters are—with one exception—alumni of the Berlin Program for Advanced German and European Studies, which has supported more than 300 scholars with research fellowships at the Freie Universität Berlin since 1986 and thus helped educate some of the most eminent scholars in that field.

Dorothee Brantz is Professor for Modern History and Urban History at the Technical University Berlin. Her research focusses on urban environmental history, human-animal relations as well as on the intersections between war and the environment. Dorothee Brantz is a Berlin Program Alumna.

Karin Goihl is Academic Coordinator of the Berlin Program for Advanced German and European Studies at the Freie Universität Berlin.

Konrad H. Jarausch is the Lurcy Professor of European Civilization at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He has written or edited some forty books on modern German and European history.

Ned Richardson-Little is an Associate Research Fellow at the University of Exeter working on the Leverhulme Trust project *1989 after 1989: Rethinking the Fall of State Socialism in Global Perspective* and a Berlin Program Alumnus.

Harald Wenzel is Professor of Sociology at the John F. Kennedy Institute for North American Studies of the Freie Universität Berlin. His research focuses on sociological theory, the sociology of mass media, religion, and catastrophes.
