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## **Course Description**

This course is designed for the beginner student with no prior knowledge of German. It aims to develop your communicative competences in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The book *Netzwerk A1* and additional material, which is primarily dealing with cultural and historical aspects of German(y), will help you develop your individual language skills. One of the foci of the course is placed on Berlin and its surroundings, so you will work with authentic material.

## **Learning Objectives**

By the end of this course, you will be able to deal with various everyday situations in a German-speaking environment and to conduct simple conversations. You will have developed reading strategies that allow you to gather specific information from factual texts, newspaper and magazine articles, and short literary texts. In addition, you will learn to write and revise short texts and, by doing so, assemble metalinguistic knowledge. Finally, you will be able to understand discussions on familiar topics.

## **Topics**

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## Competences to be gained

## Reception

#### Listening

Student can understand familiar, simple, and everyday expressions and questions, if the other person speaks slowly and clearly and provides help by repeating and circumscribing expressions.

#### Reading

Student can understand simple adapted texts as well as basic information given in posters, schedules, forms, housing ads, websites of museums and other material in everyday language. Student can extract relevant information from texts (if they contain illustrations/international words).

#### Production

#### Speaking

Student can introduce him-/herself and others in simple sentences and answer questions about personal details and everyday life. With frequently used expressions that he/she knows by heart, he/she can interact in routine matters such as shopping, going to a restaurant, seeing a doctor, and travelling, provided the other person adjusts themselves to his/her limited language skills.

#### Writing

Student can provide simple, everyday information in written form (e.g. postcards). Student can fill out forms (from administrative bodies, hotels, universities) with personal data. Student can connect simple sentences to write about his/her immediate environment, daily routines, and family and friends.

#### Reflection

#### Self-correction

Student can correct vocabulary use and conjugated forms in structured dialogues, if the teacher provides hints.

#### Socio-cultural competence

Student has a basic knowledge of some cultural aspects in Germanspeaking countries like greetings, dealing with time, behaviour in public, or responding to personal invitations.

#### Self-reflection

Student can reflect, in his/her native language, on experiences in learning German. Student can also increasingly reflect on personal learning strategies as well as strong and weak points in studying German. Student can assess progress and define his/her own learning goals.

#### **Student Prerequisites**

Participation in this language course requires adequate language skills. After having been admitted, students will need to complete an online test provided by the program that will determine the participant's German language abilities. Should these not meet the requirements for this level, we will discuss switching levels or a withdrawal from the course with the student. Students should have completed at least three semesters of higher education when the course starts.

#### **General Requirements**

Weekly live sessions will be combined with recorded video lessons and intensive work through the course webpage, both individually and in groups. Attendance of the live sessions is mandatory (for the specific time slot, see above). We recommend that you make sure to have a quiet and appropriate working space. To ensure a comfortable learning environment for all, please adhere to our <u>Code of Online Conduct</u>.

This course features a certain amount of independent coursework and thus expects you to be able to set up a self-disciplined study routine. Please see course requirements for the various formats and weight of the course assignments as well as forms of assessment.
