### Course Description

This course aims to systematically improve your writing and reading competences. It focuses on your acquisition of complex linguistic structures and your consistent self-correction. It will help you further develop effective reading and listening strategies by using texts and listening examples that extend beyond everyday communication. In-class discussions will be based on the weekly reading of literary and non-literary texts that will motivate you to exchange information, ideas, and opinions. In addition, these texts will provide important cultural and historical background information. Grammar revision is just one of the foci of this course; yet, you will expand and deepen your knowledge of German grammar through specific exercises.

### Learning Objectives

In this course you will expand your competences in speaking and writing while emphasizing self-correction. Furthermore, this course will help you to increase your vocabulary, to deepen grammar usage, and develop effective reading and listening strategies. In addition, you will analyze and interpret cultural, political, and historical topics in German speaking countries and compare them with your own cultural background. By the end of this course you will have developed and regularly use new strategies for language acquisition. You will be able to engage in detailed discussions on above mentioned topics. Furthermore, you will have developed reading strategies that will allow you to understand different text types in detail. In addition, you will improve your essay writing skills, i.e. you will be able to write texts on different topics, revise and proofread them.

## Competences to be gained

### Reception

#### Listening

Student can follow a standard conversation and grasp the main points even if it goes beyond familiar matters. Student can understand the main topics of a television or radio program, when spoken clearly and at reasonable speed.

#### Reading

Student can understand longer and more complex texts dealing with contemporary subjects. Student can comprehend the arguments and the views of the author. Student can understand a short prose text provided it is using standard language.

### Production

#### Speaking

Student can understand most of the everyday situations encountered in a German-speaking environment such as work, living, leisure, etc. Student can produce connected narratives and express wishes, hopes, dreams and feelings. Student can use reason and give explanations regarding opinions and plans. Student can follow the plot of movies and books and give a brief summary.

#### Writing

Student can produce structured texts on familiar and new topics. Student can write about experiences and impressions and write short stories in past tense. Student can use reason and give explanations regarding opinions in writing.

### Reflection

#### Self-correction

The feeling for the language has developed so that self-correction is more prevalent, and correction from the teacher is needed less.

#### Socio-cultural competence

Student has gained deeper insight into aspects of German society and history. Is increasingly aware of the subtlety and nuance of language.

#### Self-reflection

Critical self-reflection accompanies language acquisition. Student can express his/her educational aims, can recognize his/her own strengths and weaknesses and implement individual learning techniques.

## Student Prerequisites

Students should have completed at least three semesters of higher education when the course starts.

## General Requirements

Attendance of the weekly live sessions is mandatory (for the specific time slot, see above). These live sessions will be combined with recorded video lessons and intensive work through the online course platform, both individually and in groups. Altogether, this course awards credits for 30 contact hours and 90 hours of additional workload as well as completion of the [Portfolio Intercultural Awareness \(PIA\)](#). Please see course requirements for the various formats and weight of the course assignments as well as forms of assessment.

This course features a certain amount of independent coursework and thus expects you to be able to set up a self-disciplined study routine.
