
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THE CONTEXT: THREE LEARNING GARDENS AT UBC

- All are largely student-led projects together with faculty, staff & community
- We grow food and art materials, teach and learn from each other, cook and eat together, make art (sculpture, drawing, poetry, music, dance,...), do research, teach courses, hold conferences and more.
- All are egalitarian and cut across lines of age, status, university disciplines and faculties, communities, ethnicities, genders,








WHAT BUILDS COMMUNITY?
