FINDING AN INTERNSHIP IN THE UNITED STATES

STEPS

- 1. Start early! Plan enough time for internship search and visa application process
- 2. Use contacts (friends, employer, career center, LinkedIn, etc.)
- 3. Conduct online research
- 4. Apply with targeted, customized application materials
- 5. Follow-up
- 6. Once internship opportunity confirmed, find a J-1 visa sponsor
- 7. Is your host company familiar with the J-1 visa?



FINDING AN INTERNSHIP IN THE UNITED STATES

APPLICATION TIPS

- 1. Online job portals
- 2. Send an application to targeted contacts on website or via e-mail as instructed (human resources & relevant person)
- 3. Cover letter and CV: 1-page each (spell and style check by native speaker)
- 4. Additional documents and recommendation letters usually not needed when first applying



RESUME AND COVER LETTER

- Short, friendly, professional e-mail when applying
- <u>Targeted</u> customized cover letter (one page)
 - "Dear Mr./ Ms.____"
 - Highlight your relevant skills
 - Express confidence in your abilities
- <u>Targeted</u> relevant resume (one page)
 - Strong verbs
 - Highlight your relevant experiences / responsibilities
- No photo, no marital status, no birthdate
- Use online templates (such as resume.com)
- Spell-check by native English speaker





Job Application - Interview

- Be familiar with the company, the job description & your application materials
- What do you hope to gain from this opportunity?
- What are your strengths and weaknesses?
- Be confident
- Come prepared with questions
- Sending a THANK YOU email is expected.

Questions you should ask:

- What tasks will you complete? Are they related to your studies?
- How big is the company?
- Will you receive compensation for the internship? How much per month?
- Will the company provide any additional support (i.e. finding housing)?
- Do you need a car?
- Does your host company have experience with international interns?





The J-1 Visa

- "Exchange Visitor" Visa
- Temporary, non-immigrant visa
- For foreign students and young professionals
- Complete practical training for up to 18 months
- +30 days before & after internship for travel





The J-1 Visa

- Issued by a U.S. consulate **after** you have received a "Certificate of Eligibility" (DS-2019)
- Only possible with a visa sponsor, such as Cultural Vistas
- U.S. Department of State lists all visa sponsors http://jlvisa.state.gov/participants/how-to-apply/sponsor-search



Role of the J-1 Sponsor

Evaluates visa application & grants Visa

U.S. Consulate

SEVIS – Monitoring the foreign visitor location & activity

DHS

Bureau of Educational & Cultural Affairs

- Oversees Exchange Visitor Programs
- Designates & supports sponsors
 & evaluates program success
- Writes & enforces regulations, evaluates program administration, & responds to incidents

State
Department

Cultural ` Vistas (Sponsor)

- Partners with companies to facilitate robust exchange programs
- Facilitates visa application process – deems eligible
- Monitors program to ensure compliance with federal regulations
- Participant advocate
- Shares best practices around creating successful exchange programs

Participants

- Gains valuable professional skills
- Shares own culture and learns about American culture
- Returns home to share learning
- Creates relationships that contribute to increased global understanding

Host Companies

- Provides training and mentorship for participants
- Exposes participants to American culture
- Creates relationships that contribute to increased global understanding



Role of the J-1 Visa Sponsor

- Screen participants and host companies for eligibility
- Work with host company to write training plan
- Facilitate visa application process and issue the "Form DS-2019"
- Ensure compliance with federal regulations
- In-country support
- Maintain visa record in SEVIS
- Report to Department of State





Intern

You are currently a student or have recently earned your degree recently.

Maximum duration: 12 months

Trainee

You earned your degree at least 12 months before you start your program and you have at least one year of work experience.

Maximum duration: 18 months

Teacher

You have a degree in education and work experience in an educational institution.

Maximum duration: Up to 3 years

- New host company screened & visited
- Eligibility reviewed
- Phone interview conducted
- Training plan written
- DS-2019 issued



- Appointment with U.S. consulate
- Interview
- Consulate reviews DS-2019 and training plan
- Visa issued in passport







Eligibility for the J-1 visa

- At least one year of study completed
- Strong ties between field of study and field of training
- Training Plan (Form DS-7002)
- Paid internship recommended

not allowed:

Casual labor
Health fields
Medicine, Veterinary, Dentistry
Child Care / Elder Care
Direct contact / care of patients
Therapy / counselling / social work

CALCULATING THE COST OF YOUR PROGRAM

"Personal funds" = funds you have available (such as savings) at the time of application / interview.



COSTS

COMPLETING AN INTERNSHIP IN THE U.S.

- J-1 visa can only be obtained through a "sponsoring organization", which always charges for its services.
- Example for 3-month internship program costs

Program Fee:

\$775 + SEVIS \$180 + \$70 insurance per month + consular interview fee \$160...

| Program Length | Student* |
|-----------------|----------|
| Up to 3 months | \$775 |
| Up to 6 months | \$975 |
| Up to 12 months | \$1,275 |
| Up to 18 months | N/A |




ANTICIPATING COSTS

- In addition to visa fees, many factors influence the cost:
 - Paid or unpaid?
 - Duration
 - Location
 - Cost of living
- It is helpful to calculate projected costs in advance of final confirmation with host company

Global Advancement Internship Network (GAIN)

- 16-week internship placement program with group structure
- Placements throughout United States
- 3 start dates during year (Summer, Fall, Spring)
- Currently limited to STEM / technical fields
- Additional costs (orientation, placement service, virtual components)

During Your Internship Experience

Services & Support: Train USA

- Pre-departure intercultural information
- Information on U.S. business practices
- Orientation:
 - Obtaining the visa, border crossing, reporting requirements, rules
 - US living, housing, transportation, banking, safety
 - Social Security card, healthcare system, taxes
- Tax software (paid by Cultural Vistas)
- Mid-program and final evaluations
- Cultural and professional networking events
- Language courses
- Travel with other participants
- 24-hour emergency service
