







Bachelor's degree and state exam - Undergraduate Degrees

An undergraduate degree leads to a first university degree qualifying for a profession (bachelor's degree, bachelor's degree with teaching option, state examination, first law examination).




Admission and Application Process

Admission restrictions

- Most study programs have an admission restriction (Numerus Clausus)
- The Latin term *Numerus Clausus* stands for "restricted number" and means that the number of applicants admitted must not be (much) higher than the number of available places (as calculated by the respective university).
- To see whether a study program has restricted admission, look out for the phrase "lokale Zulassungsbeschränkung"/"Restricted admission" in the program description at the link below

Admission restrictions




■ "Restricted admission" → limited number of study places; applicants chosen through different criteria (GPA and others)

■ "Unrestricted admission" →
unlimited number of study places;
every applicant who meets the
admission requirements, will get
offered a study place

Application and Admission Process

Applying in 7 Steps



Step 1: Review Admission Requirements

Required for the **application**:

- a higher education entrance qualification (HZB)
- Sufficient German skills (except for Bachelor's and Master's programs in English)
- Additional language skills, depending on the study program

Higher Education Entrance Qualification (HZB) (relevant for undergraduate programs)

- Whether you have a higher education entrance qualification that is accepted as equal to the German HZB depends on your educational background.
- Conditions usually include the following:
 - a high school diploma or school-leaving qualification from your native country that grants you access to higher education in your native country or, as the case may be,
 - a combination of school-leaving qualification, university entrance exam and/or years already enrolled as a student at a university.



Higher Education Entrance Qualification (HZB) (relevant for undergraduate programs)



What type of higher education entrance qualification do I have? (relevant for undergraduate programs)



CHECK

Check: university admission

If you wish to study in Germany, you need a University entrance qualification, called "Hochschulzugangsberechtigung" or "HZB" for short. This database was developed in cooperation with the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD). Its contents are based on the guidelines provided by the Central Office for Foreign Education (ZAB).

Find out quickly and simply if you are qualified to study in Germany using your Educational certificates.

Studienkolleg

- If you have an indirect university entrance qualification, you apply for your desired degree program via uni-assist at the FU Berlin and are then invited to take the Scholastic Assessment Test (Entry Test).
- The preparatory course lasts 1 year. All-day classes take place on five weekdays in various subjects, and in German.

German Skills

For the application, you need one of these certificates

- C1 CEFR certificate with grades
- <u>TestDaF</u> with at least level 4 in two parts and level 3 in two parts (f.e. 4/4/3/3)
- language evaluation test, which attests skills at level C1 CEFR
- DSH 1

For enrollment (shortly before semester start), you need one of these certificates

- DSH 2 (test offered by FU Berlin)
- Telc C 1-Hochschule (at least "good"/"gut")
- C 2-Zertifikat des Goethe-Instituts
- Deutsches Sprachdiplom der Kultusministerkonferenz - Zweite Stufe (DSD II)
- Feststellungsprüfung des Studienkollegs (Assessment Exam of the Studienkolleg)
- <u>TestDaF</u> with at least level 4 in all four parts

Additional Language Skills

Some degree programs require English (or other language) proficiency for enrollment.

What additional language skills do I need to prove?

You can check on <u>www.fu-berlin.de/en/studium/studienangebot/grundstaendige/</u> whether the degree program of your choice requires additional skills in another language.

How can I provide proof of language skills?

Admission Requirements

For admittance to the master's program applicants need to fulfill the following admission requirements:

- Bachelor's degree in business administration with a minimum of 18 credit points in accounting and/or taxation and also with a minimum of 18 credit points in mathematics, statistics, and/or econometrics or an equivalent degree with a minimum of 18 credit points in accounting and/or taxation and also with a minimum of 18 credit points in mathematics, statistics, and/or econometrics.
- Proof of English language skills (level B2 CEFR) or equivalent.
- Applicants are required to show the ability to treat subjects in the areas of Management and/or Marketing under supervision with scientifically sound methods. The Bachelor's thesis or a term paper of at least 15 pages text may serve as proof of this ability.

The DSH - or German Language University Entrance Exam for Foreign Students - is obligatory for all applicants whose first language is not German and who have earned their initial degree from a university (or equivalent institution) where the language of instruction is not German.

Detailed information on application requirements can be found on the master's program's website.

Admission Requirements

For admittance to the master's program applicants need to fulfill the following admission requirements:

- Bachelor's degree in art history or equivalent university degree with credit points in art history corresponding to the program at Freie Universität Berlin with at least 60 credit points.
- Proof of English language skills (level B1 CEFR).
- Proof of another modern foreign language (level B1 CEFR) or Latin language skills.

The DSH - or German Language University Entrance Exam for Foreign Students - is obligatory for all applicants whose first language is not German and who have earned their initial degree from a university (or equivalent institution) where the language of instruction is not German.







VPD - preliminary review documentation



What is a preliminary review documentation (VPD)?

We create the VPD for some universities. It contains the following information:


- which educational certificates were presented
- how uni-assist evaluates these educational certificates
- how uni-assist rates the grade within the German system of grades



Before application – VPD

- Having the documents of your HZB checked by uni-assist
- Valid for only one university and only for one year

Applying in 7 Steps



Undergraduate degree programs: Documents needed for the VPD/application

In general:

- Upload school leaving and university certificates (in original language)
- Upload official translations of all certificates if issued in any language other than English or German
- Upload proof of sufficient knowledge of German (exception: North American Studies)

Additional information:

- If you have to prove other language skills for your study program, you need to do so upon enrollment, hence it is not part of the application process.
- Applicants with certificates from China, India or Vietnam have to submit the original certification from an Academic Evaluation Centre (Akademische Prüfstelle APS) in addition to the required documents.
- Missing documents due to flight: request self-disclosure form from uni-assist (application still possible)

Graduate degree programs: Documents needed for the VPD/application

In general:

- graduation certificate (if you have completed your studies)
- official current transcript of records (with an overall grade)
- Upload official translations of all certificates if issued in any language other than English or German
- If required, upload proof of sufficient knowledge of German
- If required, upload proof of sufficient proof of <u>English language knowledge</u>

Additional information:

- Applicants with certificates from China, India or Vietnam have to submit the original certification from an Academic Evaluation Centre (Akademische Prüfstelle APS) in addition to the required documents.
- Missing documents due to flight: request self-disclosure form from uni-assist (application still possible)

Special documents needed for application for Master's programs

- If you do not have completed your bachelor's program, you can apply with a Transcript of Records instead under two conditions:
 - 1. You have completed at least 2/3 of your study program
 - 2. You have registered for the bachelor's thesis (but not all of our Master programs require this)

- No VPD required if you have a German university degree
- Two parallel applications possible

Application deadlines for Undergraduate Degree Programs

Undergraduate study programs with restricted admission + combination's bachelors

for the summer semester: 01.12. - 15.01. / for the winter semester: 01.06.- 15.07.

Undergraduate study programs with unrestricted admission

for the summer semester: 01.12. - 01.03. / for the winter semester: 01.06. - 01.09.

Exception:

31.05. (winter semester): High school graduates of earlier years from EEA countries who want to apply for Veterinary Medicine, Pharmacy, Human Medicine or Dentistry



for the summer semester: 01.12. - 15.01. / for the winter semester: 15.04. - 31.05.

Master programs with unrestricted admission & Master of Education

for the summer semester: 01.12. - 15.02. / for the winter semester: 15.04. - 15.08.

Step 5: Admission quotas for Bachelor programs


8 % to applicants with no German abitur AND no EU citizenship (5 % in Veterinary Medicine and Pharmacy)

of the rest:

20 % according to the grade point average (GPA)

20 % according to the number of waiting semesters

60 % according to a quota of the university GPA + practical/vocational experiences, or GPA + study test



Selection Process for Master programs


> 5 % hardships

Remaining study places:

- > 20 % wait time
- > 80 % university quota*

*calculation depends on the master program's admission statues; usually the **grade point average** of your bachelor degree **plus additional points** for vocational experience, or subject-related specialisations, or an interview, or an combination of all.
